'2b', '6b' and '13b' are the original locations of the Scotch Thistle, Lord Melbourne and Royal Oak respectively. '16' is the intended site of the North Adelaide Hotel; the licence application was refused (1881) and the pub was never built. The Hibernia Inn (1840-1842) was very probably at '17'; the Farmers' Arms (1840-1841) was possibly also at '2', arguably the best location for a pub in colonial North Adelaide.
