

Key to the historic pubs of North Adelaide

'2b', '6b' and '13b' are the original locations of the Scotch Thistle, Lord Melbourne and Royal Oak respectively. '16' is the intended site of the North Adelaide Hotel; the licence application was refused (1881) and the pub was never built. The Hibernia Inn (1840–1842) was very probably at '17'; the Farmers' Arms (1840–1841) was possibly also at '2', arguably the best location for a pub in colonial North Adelaide.
